Caring for our local area

I'm sure many of you, like me, have been saddened to see how our local area around school is blighted by some individuals with dog fouling, obstructive and dangerous parking, and litter (including things like broken glass) being persistent problems. Where we can, we go well beyond what is expected of a school, and we clear things up ourselves. We also do contact the council about these problems, but we now need everyone's help with this. I would encourage all of our parents - and with over 350 pupils, we have a lot of parents - to be reporting their concerns. By working as a large parent group, we can really get the voices of Ellacombe heard! Let's work as a whole community on this and ensure our area is a safe and pleasant area for all. As part of this, can I ask that parents do not park on the double yellow lines at the front of school to drop off. This causes an obstruction and is dangerous. This again is about all working as a whole community.

Finally, I do need to still remind about COVID. This has not gone away, and we do not want any outbreaks locally as we saw the devastating impact this had in January with several classes even having to work remotely, such was the chronic impact on staffing.



Please remember:

Regular asymptomatic testing

• The Government has removed guidance for staff and students in most education and childcare settings to undertake twice-weekly asymptomatic testing. Of course, if you have access to test kits and would like to continue testing, then we would welcome this. Until the 1st April, you can still order home kits.

• If there is an outbreak, Public Health may instruct us to return to testing and it is our understanding that tests will be provided for you to use.

Self-isolation and contact-tracing

• The Government will remove the legal requirement to self-isolate following a positive test. However, if your child tests positive, you are advised to keep your child at home (and therefore not attend school) and avoid contact with other people for at least five full days. We will not be able to admit any children into school who are Covid positive. They should then continue to follow the guidance until they have received 2 negative test results on consecutive days.

• If your child has COVID 19 or we suspect that they have Covid 19 we can instruct parents to keep them at home and advise they are tested. Of course, we have worked together throughout this pandemic, and we are hopeful that this action would not be applied.

• We need to act as this were any other infectious illness e.g., chicken pox. If your child is likely to spread an illness, we would ask that you keep them at home, and we would ask that you do the same if it is Covid related. This means we minimise the spread and keep staffing levels high enough to sustain face to face learning.

• If a member of your household has Covid, we would encourage you to support us by LFT testing children (over 5 years old) who are attending school. Doing this for 7 days (whilst they are most infectious), gives us the best possible chance of keeping Covid low and our community safe.

- There will be further changes from April $1^{\mbox{\tiny st.}}$ and we will share these as soon as we have them.
